

#### Bridging the Gap through Awareness, Collaboration, and Art

For resource-limited communities to be healthy and flourish, they require rapid and accurate diagnostics and treatment for a variety of diseases. Using the Global Alliance for Rapid Diagnostics (GARD), which provides affordable and accessible diagnostic technologies in communities throughout the world, this can be a reality by bridging the communication gap between researchers, manufacturers, and users of rapid diagnostics.

Chelsie Boodoo, has worked to expand GARD and teach members how to engage with their communities, locally and internationally, in order to freely share solutions, technologies, and ideas. Continuing to educate community members about rapid diagnostics will strengthen the healthcare system and save lives.

#### ALEXANDRA LEE, College of Education

#### Aligning Student Passions with Regional Education Services (ASPiRES)

Alexandra Lee is seeking to better understand how K-12 students explore career paths in a way that promotes motivation, resilience, and achievement. The Aligning Student Passions with Regional Education Services (ASPiRES) project has allowed Lee to better situate students' understanding of career development and the institutional practices that may support them in developing their career goals.

Her partnership with the Ingham Intermediate School District (IISD) has resulted in IISD leaders becoming aware of potential stereotype threats and equity concerns from language used and suggested careers identified for specific groups of students. As a result, IISD has taken steps to be more intentional with language regarding future career opportunities for students.

#### Commendations for Exceptional Effort in Community Engagement Scholarship

#### Sophie Huss, College of Natural Science

### Ethical Mining through Community Engagement of Indigenous, Industry, and Government Partners

Sophie Huss' research revolves around utilizing natural resources in mining to limit environmental harm. Her original work took place in the Bahamas, and lessons learned there translated to her efforts in Michigan. Throughout her research, Huss has been reminded of conflicting opinions regarding mining, and has remained deeply influenced by the 'Four R's' of Indigenous research: respect, relevance, reciprocity, and responsibility. She is continuing to investigate ethical training for scientists and engineers who work with Indigenous people in mining communities.

#### Alyssa LaBerge, College of Social Science

#### The Juvenile Risk Assessment Team: A Community Research Collaboration

Alyssa LaBerge and her team are working with the Ingham County 30th Circuit Court-Family Division to implement broad policy and practice changes using evidence-based methods to combat high rates of crime among adolescents and reduce the likelihood that youth will engage in criminal activity again. Through the risk needs responsivity (RNR) framework, services for offenders are individualized and "matched" to a juvenile based on their risk, needs, and responsivity to services. Much of LaBerge's research is guided by reactions to strain, and coping mechanisms, with a particular focus on juvenile delinquency as a behavioral coping mechanism.

#### CORINN RUTKOSKI, College of Natural Science

Corinn Rutkoski's research focuses on how the inclusion of conservation areas in agricultural lands impacts—and can benefit—soil and microbial communities. She has contributed to the communication of work broadly related to the fields of ecology, evolution, and agriculture, including:

- Organizing a series of policymaker visits to the Kellogg Biological Station
- Identifying how scientists can effectively engage with those outside of academics, including farmers and crop advisors
- Leading high school class sessions focused on plant-microbe mutualisms
- Teaching a course on nature journaling for public audiences

### CAREGIVING, AGING, RESEARCH, AND EDUCATION WITH AGEALIVE AND IMPART ALLIANCE

#### Clare C. Luz, College of Osteopathic Medicine

#### City of East Lansing Prime Time Seniors Program

Introduced by Kathleen M. Wilbur, Senior Vice President for Government Relations

Dr. Clare Luz's work focuses on quality of life for aging adults and concerns related to healthcare, the economy, and labor markets. She has founded two organizations, IMPART Alliance and MSU AgeAlive, which led to MSU being internationally recognized as an Age-Friendly University, and positioned MSU to respond to population aging on state and national levels.

IMPART Alliance addresses a severe direct care worker (DCW) shortage through training and advocacy. Luz has been instrumental in bringing community-based stakeholders together to work for change. She chairs multiple statewide initiatives including the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) DCW Advisory Committee and is Principal Investigator on a project to establish a statewide employer-led DCW collaborative. Under her leadership, major policy reforms to elevate this workforce are being implemented and recognized nationally.

MSU AgeAlive is advancing aging-related research, teaching, and community outreach. Its mission is lifelong well-being for all, regardless of age or ability, through intergenerational experiences, engagement in meaningful activities, and connection to community. Partnerships with the East Lansing Prime Time Seniors Program and the MSU Social Science Scholars Program are vital to this work. Joint initiatives include the Senior Ambassadors Program, which matches MSU students with isolated seniors at risk for Ioneliness. Matched pairs develop mutually rewarding friendships through weekly Zoom meetings and consistently report positive results.

COMMUNITY-ENGAGED LEARNING: BRIDGING MEDICAL EDUCATION AND COMMUNITY-BASED STRATEGIES TO LEVERAGE HEALTH SCIENCES, SOCIAL INITIATIVES, AND EVIDENCE-BASED KNOWLEDGE

Dr. Carolina Restini and her community partners work with high schools surrounding the MSU College of Osteopathic Medicine (MSUCOM) campuses at the Macomb University Center and Detroit Medical Center to enrich the educational experiences of high school students while allowing medical students to serve as educators. Fostering this relationship enhances the objective of constructing a sustainable program that empowers high schoolers to utilize their newfound knowledge to make informed decisions. Under MSUCOM faculty mentorship, Osteopathic Medical Students (OMS) learn from and serve their community to strengthen connections between MSU and communities in southeast Michigan. This project was converted into a program, and is founded on three community-engaged strategies, including:

- OMS sharing their experiences and pathways to becoming medical students, and promoting healthcare to inspire high school students
- Teaching basic sciences surrounding clinical case discussions and research protocols for students taking advanced placement courses
- Offering instruction for substance use awareness and prevention

Through these approaches, Restini and her partners have successfully developed an inclusive and socially responsible program empowering both high school and medical students to take an active role in their education, while also promoting health and wellness in communities typically underserved by the healthcare system.

MSU AND THE LANSING SCHOOL DISTRICT: BUILDING AN INTERGENERATIONAL CONSTELLATION OF PARTNERSHIPS WITH LATINX AND INDIGENOUS LANSING SCHOOL DISTRICT YOUTH AND FAMILIES

#### J. Estrella Torrez, Residential College in the Arts and Humanities

Nationally, graduation rates amongst Indigenous and Latinx youth have increased over the past twenty years, but these rates are not reflected in the Lansing School District (LSD). In response to these findings, the LSD has pivoted to activate the vast community resources in Greater Lansing, including Michigan State University, to provide Indigenous and Latinx students across the Greater Lansing area the opportunity to engage in building community around storytelling, place-making, cross-peer mentoring, and youth participatory action research. Through a series of community-generated, youth-led activities, Torrez and the LSD have worked diligently to provide culturally responsive programs to address communityidentified needs.

In 2009, Dr. Torrez co-founded the Indigenous Youth Empowerment Program (IYEP) with Becky Roy, Native American program coordinator with the LSD, and Ashley Harding, Native American outreach advocate with the Ingham County Health Department. IYEP has grown to become a central component to the school district's support for the local Indigenous community.

Torrez continued to develop her partnership with the LSD working alongside Sergio Keck, deputy superintendent of special populations, to serve the LSD's Latinx community through the "Nuestros Cuentos" project, which focuses on working together to reimagine public spaces, and the Latinx Leadership Program.

#### ENGAGING COMMUNITY IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF LOW-COST TECHNOLOGIES FOR ENVIRONMENTAL MONITORING TO PROMOTE ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH LITERACY IN A LOW-TRUST SETTING: THE COMMUNITY-DRIVEN FLINT PROJECT

During the Flint water crisis, residents struggled to find committed partners who would listen to their concerns and help them mobilize the resources they needed to answer their own questions. In spring 2015, Flint residents and researchers invited Dr. Carrera to be involved in an investigation of residents' water quality concerns. Since then, Carrera has been partnering actively with Flint residents and Flint-based researchers to support the community's research inquiries and address their scientific concerns. By collaborating with Flint's Community Based Organization Partners, Carrera has helped support the capacity of Flint residents to answer their own scientific research questions. As a sociologist and a non-community academic partner, she aims to understand and enhance community capacity to lead scientific inquiry. With her collaborators' full partnership. Carrera secured funding for a project to increase trust in the research team and enhance community interest in science as a form of democracy. Her team continues to seek funding to elevate the capacity of Flint leaders to serve as a model for communitydriven research, create a network of non-community academic partners, and deliver an alternative, transferable model for advancing science in support of environmentally marginalized communities across the country.

Dr. Maria Lapinski and her colleagues have worked for years with collaborators in China to understand the conservation behaviors and motivations of Tibetan pastoralists, the nomadic herders of yaks and other animals who live on the Tibetan Plateau in a way of life that is tens of thousands of years old. The team has engaged nomadic Tibetans and those who serve them to strengthen conservation practices that can protect the environmental integrity of the Plateau and the livelihoods of its people.

Lapinski and assistant professor with the University of Arizona, Rain Liu, along with Jinhua Zhao, professor at Cornell University, and John Kerr of MSU's Department of Community Sustainability, have worked closely with Lu Zhi, founder of the Shan Shui Conservation Center and professor of Conservation Biology at Peking University.

On field visits to the Plateau, the team listened to and worked with community members and field staff to learn about the issues most important to community members and design appropriate studies. The team also led community-based workshops to introduce conservation practices with the involvement of influential local Tibetans. The project findings and lessons resulted in policy briefs and a set of best practices disseminated through networks, in-person sessions, and social media.

#### CHRISTOPHER P. LONG, College of Arts and Letters and Honors College

Dr. Christopher P. Long is a Michigan State University Foundation Professor and dean of two colleges: the College of Arts and Letters and the Honors College. He is committed to the transformative power of a liberal arts education and is a leading advocate for public scholarship, community-engaged participatory research, and a values-enacted approach to academic life.

Under his leadership, several advances have been made to help raise the College of Arts and Letters' international reputation including the creation of the Center for Interdisciplinarity, the Citizen Scholars program, the Critical Diversity in a Digital Age initiative, and the Excel Network.

Long has successfully established the College of Arts and Letters as a catalyst of innovation and collaboration at MSU through signature partnerships with the MSU Libraries to create the Digital Scholarship Lab, and with the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources and the College of Communication Arts and Sciences to advance a holistic approach to food research.

He has over \$7 million of funded research projects, including the Andrew W. Mellon funded *Less Commonly Taught Languages Partnership* with the Big 10 Academic Alliance, a participatory research initiative and teaching framework developed in reciprocal partnership with Indigenous communities, including Indigenous faculty and language instructors. With this grant, MSU will partner with other universities, tribal colleges, and tribal communities to establish a larger community that connects and sustains Indigenous language work at institutions.

Additional projects include the *Public Philosophy Journal*, an innovative online publication for accessible scholarship that deepens our understanding of publicly relevant issues; *HuMetricsHSS*, a values-enacted initiative committed to transforming higher education by aligning indicators of academic excellence with core personal and institutional values; and the *Charting Pathways of Intellectual Leadership* initiative designed to empower staff and faculty to align their core values with the processes of promotion and advancement that shape their academic lives.

Dr. Susan Masten is an exemplary faculty member whose research, teaching, and service have made important and sustained impacts on communities near and far. Masten long served as the associate chair for undergraduate studies in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering (CEE), and led several initiatives that have benefited students, faculty colleagues, the university, and communities.

Masten has served as faculty advisor for the Environmental Engineering Student Society (EESS) since 2003, taught review sessions for the Fundamentals of Engineering professional licensure exam and assisted the EESS with the organization of field trips, lectures, and an annual poster competition. She also mentored students involved in the Waste Management and Education Research Consortium Environmental Design Contest, where MSU has twice won an award for Best Overall Design. She was the founding advisor of the MSU Chapter of Engineers without Borders (EWB), and under her guidance, EWB has built water filters in Honduras, constructed composting latrines in El Salvador, and built a rainwater collection system for a school in Tanzania.

Masten became involved with the water-related issues in Flint, Michigan by analyzing available data on the operation of the Flint Water Treatment Plant, which led to publications and presentations to numerous engineering societies in the United States, New Zealand, and Taiwan.

Masten also has extensive involvement mentoring Girl Scouts and Scouts BSA, and serving as a commissioner for the Meridian Township Environmental Commission, where she helps to advise Township policy on issues related to environmental protection, pollution prevention, and preservation of natural areas.
